LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

We' The People!

Our Legislative Committee is currently building a legal "Crash-Course" intended to assist newly incarcerated individuals in filing their first appeal. This program will explain the appellate process as a whole, in understandable terms. It will cover filing deadlines, rights to acquire discovery (and how to do so), how to obtain evidence, as well as how to use the public records act. This information is vital for many prisoners here at WSP, who often must learn to navigate this process through trial and error. This program could prevent people from serving several years in prison, while waiting for the gears of justice to turn on their own.

The Legislative Committee would also like to highlight the importance of the recently passed senate bill SB5101, which adds to the language of RCW 9.94A.728, the Extraordinary Medical Placement statute. There are many individuals whose circumstances could be severely impacted by this. Our members have taken it upon themselves to identify potential fellow prisoners that may be affected by this.

Lastly, the BPC in its entirety realizes the significance of the technological age we live in. Everyone needs basic computer skills to be successful in the world today. While students at WSP are assigned laptops to complete their course work, our vision is to have every prisoner in the state of Washington, attain their own personal laptop. Understandably it will be some time before we reach this goal, but it is truly a necessity to ensure reintegration into the ever-progressing society around us. In the meantime, the Legislative Committee is preparing an open letter advocating for access to a word processor and printer in the law libraries. As well as a word processor and Wi-Fi printer accessibility with delivery access from our state-issued Securus tablets. This is a short-term solution to a much greater issue, and we will continue to fight to show the importance of providing every inmate with a laptop. It only makes sense given the status quo this electronic era has ushered in.

Mary Moss is one of the BPC-WSP chapters' most dedicated sponsors. She has been professionally involved in racial equity work since the beginning of her career, and served on the Diversity Advisory Council of the Washington State Penitentiary for over 25 years. Ms. Mary has had an amazing journey with many ups and downs, that has shaped the beautiful person she is today.

Ms. Mary was born and raised in Walla Walla, WA, growing up during the Vietnam era. The influence of the times on her belief-system, was only matched by her own personal experiences. From the beginning of her time with WA DOC, she saw first-hand the racial injustices that fundamentally plagued the institution. Witnessing the regularity of these happenings amongst both inmates and

staff alike, ultimately fueled a desire to get involved in making a change. Of her many accolades, Ms. Mary credits facilitating the Annual In-Service class, teaching Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, as being her most rewarding accomplishment. To this day she personifies the important attributes she was entrusted with teaching to others. She walks the walk, and talks the talk.

Being tasked with helping people acknowledge and understand their biases has also helped Ms. Mary to confront her own. As part of her training to work in WA DOC, she took part in a class called, "Working with Hispanic Offenders", in which one of the exercises was "every-one has a bias". Through taking this class, she had a revelation about her own personal prejudice, leading to an eyeopening experience that went full-circle when years later, she

used the same exercises to open the eyes of others.

When asked what she was most excited to see happen within the BPC recently, Ms. Mary stated,

"I'm just so happy after seven long years of work, to finally see the BPC grow for you guys." She's been with us from the start, seeing the growth and development of individuals, as well as our organization.

"I've been here a while and known [some of these guys] for years. I really don't care about their criminal background, because I can see how dedicated they are to the work they do. My mother always told me, 'one person can make a difference', and I really see that here." Ms. Mary reiterated her mothers quote while explaining her reasons for being involved with the BPC.

The amount of positivity and productivity that Ms. Mary brings to us in indispensable.

She is a truly committed sponsor and we are blessed to have her support.
